PRAYER

Advent – A Time of Waiting

Writings and devotions adapted from The Weary World Rejoices - an Advent Devotion from Everything Happens with Kate Bowler

The season of Advent, the days leading up to Christmas, is a promise that is coming. A promise of a return – a restoration of all things to their true being, a goodness which was conceived from the beginning of time, a realized hope we've been longing for. "The days are coming," declares the Lord, "when I will fulfill the good promise." The promise is of truth, compassion, restoration, and justice. Everything wrong will be made right, everything bad will be made good, everything empty and devoid of love will be filled.

We don't cruise into Christmas with certainty that all is well. We begin by waiting – patiently waiting. Waiting with patience is about keeping a positive, hopeful attitude during our waiting. It's trusting that good things are coming, even when we can't see them yet. True patience is a quiet strength, the grace to be at peace with the unknown and to find joy in the present. When we learn to embrace patience, we open ourselves up to life's surprises, knowing that every season has its purpose.

While we patiently wait for the birth of Jesus, we can spend time in reflection and prayer. Below is a four part devotion for the four weeks of Advent. You may choose to read, reflect, and pray one day out of the week or each day of the week, reflecting on a different question each day. This Advent, may we all join together to look for God's promises already being fulfilled.

<u>Week 1</u>: The Promise of Truth: This week we will take a closer look at what it means to hope for a future we can only glimpse, what it feels like to live in the already – but not yet, and how lament might be our best response.

Read: JEREMIAH 33:14-16

"'The days are coming,' declares the Lord, 'when I will fulfill the good promise I made to the people of Israel and Judah. 'In those days and at that time I will make a righteous Branch sprout from David's line; he will do what is just and right in the land. In those days Judah will be saved and Jerusalem will live in safety. This is the name by which it will be called: The Lord Our Righteous Savior.'"

Reflect:

- 1. What word or phrase stands out to you from this passage?
- 2. The people of Jerusalem lived in the aftermath of war and fire. Imagine listening to Jeremiah as you stand in the ashes and rubble of all you hold dear. How would you react to his words of hope and promise?
- 3. We live in the already but not yet. This means we have hope for a future of peace, safety, joy, and restoration, but may not experience it currently. Does this feel true in your own life? How so?
- 4. Living between the already but not yet means we need to make space to *lament*. Lament is a biblical practice that invites you to express your sorrow, pain, or confusion. It is the act of grieving with God. What is there to lament in your life, your community, or your world today?
- 5. If you were to pick one big hope for the world, what would it be? For your community? For your family?

Pray: God of truth, Could this be the year when we see the goodness that is coming? Could this be the Advent when we notice the inbreaking of your coming promises? Promises full of blessing, truth so clear that every shadowy lie must flee away, compassion so deep, that everyone is encircled in its embrace, restoration so complete that there is gladness everywhere, and justice so satisfying that all will be well. May this Advent be the new beginning, as we learn to live by the light of your coming promises. Amen

<u>Week 2</u>: The Promise of Compassion: Jesus is God with us so he could be God's compassion for us, in word and deed. When Jesus saw someone suffering, he wept with them, and came to their aid. There was no one whose illness or status rendered them unapproachable. This is the kind of compassion that says, I am not just helping you, I am with you.

Read: LUKE 1:68 -79

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has looked favorably on his people and redeemed them. He has raised up a mighty savior for us in the house of his child David, as he spoke through the mouth of his holy prophets from of old, that we would be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us. Thus he has shown the mercy promised to our ancestors and has remembered his holy covenant, the oath that he swore to our ancestor Abraham, to grant us that we, being rescued from the hands of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness in his presence all our days. And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways to give his people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins. Because of the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to shine upon those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."



Reflect:

- 1. What surprised you about this passage?
- 2. What reason does Zechariah give that God will fulfill God's promises? (re-read verse 78)
- 3. How have you experienced or witnesses the tenderness of God in your life?
- 4. How can you join in the work of God by sharing tenderness or compassion with someone this week?

Pray: Compassionate God, bless us with open arms to welcome you this Advent, willing to invite its promises into the center of our longing. May we find a corner of our heart where hope can stay protected, a place from which we can nurture a little gratitude, and a little compassion for you, for ourselves, and for the next person we meet. Amen

Week 3: The Promise of Restoration: The Christmas story speaks of "peace on earth and goodwill for all people." This is a world where fear and death will be no more. There will be no loneliness, no illness, and no shame. It is a declaration of the restoration that has already happened, is happening, and will one day be complete.

Read: ZEPHANIAH 3: 14 -20

"Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The Lord has taken away the judgments against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth."

Reflect:

- 1. What word or phrase stood out to you in this passage? What brings you hope? What is hard to believe?
- 2. What stands out to you about God's character and intention from Zephaniah's words? Does this feel true in your own experience?
- 3. What gets in the way of God's restoration of the world? What about the restoration God offers for your life?
- 4. God's promised restoration has begun, is happening, and will one day be complete. We can participate with the work God is doing in the world. How can you join God in the work of restoration in your life? In the world?

Pray: God who makes all things new, thank you that we are not separated into lives of loneliness but joined together as those who were loved into being. We are made for meaning and a purpose that only our days can breathe into action. Pull us closer to the bigger story that reminds us that our ordinary lives are the stuff of eternity. We are a story of extraordinary love. Amen.

Week 4: The Promise of Justice: Jesus is coming to bring justice to the world. God chose to enter our world at Christmas so God could be the difference we didn't know we needed. This week we will look at what it means to be surprised by the ways God works in the world.

Read: LUKE 1:46-55

"And Mary said, 'My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowly state of his servant. Surely from now on all generations will call me blessed, for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name; indeed, his mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty. He has come to the aid of his child Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

Reflect:

- 1. What surprises you or brings you hope from this text?
- 2. How do you define justice? What is your understanding of Jesus' definition of justice?
- 3. How does Jesus show strength and power to the world? How does this compare to how today's leaders show strength and power?
- 4. Mary sings of justice and mercy in the present tense. Where do you see glimpses of God's justice (the one rooted in mercy and grace) already happening in the world?

Pray: Merciful God, blessed are we, starting to see the height and depth and breadth of your love, that includes all of us, even the not-so-perfect. Blessed is Mary, for saying yes to the risk of being God's dwelling place. And, blessed are we, breathing in the truth that we belong, along with everybody else. Thank you, O God, for loving us so much that you sent your son into the world at Christmas time to one day make all things right. Amen.
