FROM OUR PASTOR...

The Significance of Christmas and Epiphany in the Christian Church

n the Christian tradition, the seasons of Christmas and Epiphany carry profound significance as they celebrate and reflect upon the coming of Jesus Christ into the world and His revelation to humanity. These two liturgical seasons are not just festive occasions but are filled with profound spiritual meaning, inviting believers to embrace the message of hope, love, and salvation.

The Season of Christmas

Christmas, which begins on December 25th and traditionally lasts for twelve days until January 5th, celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ. This period, known as Christmastide, is one of the most joyous times in the Christian calendar. The word "Christmas" itself comes from the Old English term "Cristes mæsse," meaning "Christ's Mass," signifying the worship of Christ.

The significance of Christmas lies in the Incarnation. Christians believe God took human form in Jesus, becoming fully divine and fully human. This extraordinary act demonstrates God's immense love for humanity, bridging the gap between God and people. The Gospel accounts of Matthew and Luke describe the humble circumstances of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, emphasizing humility and simplicity. Born in a stable and laid in a manger, Jesus' arrival shows that God's grace is accessible to all, regardless of status or wealth.

Central to the Christmas celebration is the idea of light overcoming darkness. Jesus is often called the "Light of the World," bringing hope and salvation to a world in need. This theme is reflected in traditions such as lighting candles, decorating with bright lights, and singing carols that proclaim the joyous news of Christ's birth.

The Christmas season also focuses on the Holy Family— Jesus, Mary, and Joseph—as a model of faith, obedience, and love. Feasts such as the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, on January 1st, honor Mary's pivotal role in the story of salvation. Other days, like the Feast of the Holy Innocents on December 28th, remind believers of the challenges and sacrifices surrounding Jesus' arrival into the world.

The Season of Epiphany

Epiphany, which begins on January 6th, concludes the Christmas season and opens a new chapter in the liturgical year. The word "Epiphany" comes from the Greek word "epiphaneia," meaning "manifestation" or "appearance." It commemorates the revelation of Jesus as the Son of God and Savior of all people.

The primary focus of Epiphany is the visit of the Magi, or Wise Men, to the Christ child. According to the Gospel of Matthew, these travelers from the East followed a star to find and worship Jesus, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Each gift held symbolic meaning: gold signified Jesus' kingship, frankincense His divinity, and myrrh His future suffering and death.

The Magi's journey represents the universal nature of Christ's mission—He came not only for the Jewish people but for all nations and cultures.

Epiphany also celebrates other manifestations of Jesus' divine nature, such as His baptism in the Jordan River and His first miracle at the wedding in Cana. These events reveal Jesus' identity and mission, showing how God's grace works through Him to transform the world.

Spiritual Lessons

Together, Christmas and Epiphany emphasize key themes of revelation, joy, and mission. Christmas focuses on God's love made visible in the birth of Jesus, while Epiphany highlights the wider world's recognition of this gift. Both seasons call Christians to respond to God's gift with faith, gratitude, and action.

One of the most important lessons of these seasons is the universality of God's salvation. The humility of Christ's birth and the homage of the Magi remind believers that God's love is for everyone, regardless of background or status. They also invite Christians to carry this message of hope and light into their own lives, sharing it with others through acts of kindness, service, and faith.

COUNCIL CORNER —Monday, December 9, 2024 Meeting

- Council learned that our insurance premium will increase by almost 30%. The deductible will change from \$2,500 to \$7,500.
 For hail and wind damage, the deductible will be set at 1% of the replacement value or \$100,000. In the best interest of the church, the council decided to rename the Bargholz Estate to the Contingency Fund.
- Council learned about a short program being held to honor St. Lucia, a young Christian martyr who died for her faith. Confirmation girls, along with their mothers and grandmothers, will be invited to attend and learn about St. Lucia, followed by a small breakfast. We hope to establish this as a yearly tradition held on/near December 13.
- Council learned that the Fellowship Team will host a Soup-er Bowl party on Sunday, February 9, following worship.
- Council received feedback that the *Harvest of Hope* confirmation service project was a huge success, and the confirmation students had a great experience. A big thank you goes out to the congregation for their support in making the event successful.
- The date for the Annual Meeting has been set for Sunday, January 19, following worship.
- Council was informed of a tentative Fish Fry date, scheduled for Friday, April 4. More information will be provided in the coming months.

The next meeting of the Church Council will be **Monday**, **January 13**, **2025**.
