FROM OUR PASTOR...

Lent and The Cross

s we continue our journey through Lent, we are steadily moving toward Easter morning, the day we proclaim with joy and hope that Jesus Christ is risen. But before we get to Easter, we must go through Good Friday. Resurrection cannot come without death, and life cannot triumph without first encountering suffering.

Martin Luther's Theology of the Cross speaks directly to this reality. In contrast to a "theology of glory," which tries to bypass suffering or explain it away, Luther's Theology of the Cross proclaims that God meets us precisely in our suffering. The cross is not a place of power and triumph as the world defines those things but a place of weakness, pain, and vulnerability. Yet unexpectedly, that is where God's love is revealed most profoundly.

Consider what Jesus endured on Good Friday. He was betrayed by a friend, abandoned by his followers, mocked, beaten, and crucified. He took on our pain and suffering, bearing the weight of sin and death. In that moment of agony, Jesus cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46). It's a cry that resonates deeply with anyone who has felt abandoned in their own suffering. In Jesus' suffering, God knows what it feels like to hurt, to grieve, to feel lost.

Perhaps you have experienced suffering in your own life. Maybe it came in the form of illness, the death of a loved one, a broken relationship, or a season of deep anxiety or depression. When we are in those places, it can be difficult to feel God's presence. We may ask, "Where is God in all this?"

The Theology of the Cross reminds us that God does not stand apart from our suffering. Instead, God steps directly into it. God shows up in the places we least expect—in our weakness, our brokenness, and our pain. Jesus did not bypass Good Friday; he entered fully into it. And because of this, we can trust that God is with us in our darkest moments.

I recently heard a story about a woman who had experienced profound grief after losing her husband. In the days following his death, her prayers felt empty, and worship seemed hollow. But one Sunday, as the congregation gathered around the table for Holy Communion, something shifted. As she knelt to receive the bread and wine, she remembered that her husband had stood beside her at that same rail for years. In that moment, she felt a powerful sense of connection—to her husband, to the communion of saints,

and most profoundly to Jesus himself. She described feeling that Christ was present with her in her sorrow, not to erase her grief but to bear it with her. She left worship that morning with tears in her eyes, but also with renewed hope.

This is what it means to be an Easter people. We don't deny the pain of Good Friday, but we know that suffering is not the final word. God's love brings life out of death and hope out of despair. Each Sunday is a small Easter, a reminder that Jesus continues to show up, bringing us the Good News that death has been defeated and new life is possible.

In this Lenten season, I invite you to reflect on your own experiences of suffering. Where have you felt pain or loss in your life? How has God shown up in those places? Sometimes God's presence is clear and unmistakable, like a bright light cutting through the darkness. Other times, it may feel more like a quiet whisper — a friend who listens without judgment, a hymn that gives you strength to keep going, or the steady comfort of the Holy Supper where Christ comes to us again and again.

The cross reminds us that no suffering is beyond God's reach. In Jesus' death and resurrection, we are promised that God is always working to bring new life — even when we can't yet see it. This is the hope that sustains us as we make our way toward Easter morning.

So, as we continue our Lenten journey, may we walk the path of Jesus — not bypassing suffering, but trusting that God meets us in it. And may we hold fast to the promise that resurrection awaits on the other side.

We are people of the cross, yes — but even more so, we are people of the empty tomb. Thanks be to God, who continues to meet us, sustain us, and bring life out of death.

Holy Week Prayers

Holy Week is a time to encounter Christ more closely. We are called to 1) deepen our faith through prayer, reading the scriptures, and attending worship; 2) reflect on Christ's sacrifices; and 3) find ways to love one another as Jesus loved. Here are prayers and blessings to use during your quiet prayer time. Don't try to read it all at one setting. Read one each day during Holy Week. May your love for Christ and your love for one another deepen during this sacred time.

Be still and know that I am God (from Henri Nouwen)

There is nothing in us that needs to be hidden from God's love. Our guilt...our shame...our fear...our sins...He wants to see it, touch it, heal it...and make himself known. There is no other God than the Lord of Love. Be still and know that I am God. God is not in the storm, nor in the earthquake, nor in the fire, but in the still, small voice, the gentle breeze, and the sheer silence...Be still and know that I am God. Take these words with you in the week to come...let them be like a little seed planted in the good soil of your heart and let it grow.

A Blessing for Palm Sunday (from Kate Bowler)

Jesus, from that mountain high among the olive trees, it would have been an easy journey down to the city, to Jerusalem, which lay below. So why choose to make your way on a donkey, on an everyday beast of burden, your feet almost dragging on the ground? And who are these people running, bending low, to spread their precious cloaks on the road before you, waving palm branches and shouting, "Save us! Hosanna to the Son of David!"? What is the raw and urgent hope that rises in their songs? "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" And, Jesus, why are you smiling? Because it is true what they are saying, though they can't yet know the whole of it. It is happening. It is unfolding in slow motion, the fulfillment of that promise from of old: their savior would come, humble, and riding on a donkey. Blessed are we on this side of history shouting, "Come Lord, save us too!" Blessed are all those walking forward into the great small work they do in hospitals, homes, grocery stores, and trucking companies. Blessed are we, shouting ourselves hoarse: "Hosanna! Save us! Save our world!" Blessed are those who have learned to walk in the light of your presence. (Psalm 89:15)

A Maundy Thursday Prayer (from Henri Nouwen)

I am looking to you, Lord. You have said so many loving words. Your heart has spoken so clearly. Now you want to show me, even more clearly, how much you love me. Knowing that your Father has put everything in your hands, that you have come from God and are returning to God, you remove your outer garments and, taking a towel, you wrap it around your waist, pour water into a basin and begin to wash my feet, and then wipe them with the towel you are wearing.

You look at me with utter tenderness, saying, "I want you to be with me. I want you to have a full share in my life. I want you to belong to me as much as I belong to my Father. I want to wash you completely clean so that you and I can be one and so that you can do to others what I have done to you."

I am looking at you again, Lord. You stand up and invite me to the table. As we are eating, you take bread, say the blessing, break the bread, and give it to me. "Take and eat," you say, "this is my body given for you." Then you take a cup, and, after giving thanks, you hand it to me, saying, "This is my blood, the blood of the new covenant poured out for you." Knowing that your hour has come to pass from this world to your Father and having loved me, you now love me to the end. You give me everything that you have and are. You pour out for me your very self. All the love that you carry for me in your heart now becomes manifest. You wash my feet and then give me your own body and blood as food and drink.

Sweet Jesus, words cannot express my love for you. Thank you so much for pouring out yourself in love to wash me and feed me. Please refresh and feed others through me. I ask in your precious Name. Amen.
